DID YOU KNOW

This is what ACBL has to say about: **Opening 1NT with a Singleton.**

On many occasions when 1NT is opened with a singleton, someone becomes upset with opener. Frequently it's an opponent, but often it's opener's partner who has transferred into opener's short suit. This results in the partnership playing in a 5-1 fit when the contract should have been in notrump.

Bridge players have different understandings of what the rules are concerning opening 1NT with a singleton. It has been described as illegal, immoral, unethical or fattening. The answer is almost always—none of the above.

The ACBL General Convention Chart states: "A notrump opening or overcall is natural if not unbalanced (generally, no singleton or void and only one or two doubletons)." If your notrump opening shows a balanced hand, you may occasionally pick up a hand with a singleton which you may want to treat as balanced. You may use your bridge judgment to open or overcall a notrump with a singleton, provided that: (1) It is a rare occurrence (no more than 1% of the time); (2) your partner expects you to have at least two cards in each suit; and (3) you and partner have no agreements which enable you to discover that partner has a singleton.

Law 40 (Partnership Understandings) stipulates that a partnership MAYNOT have an agreement to open 1NT with an unbalanced hand.

EDUCATION: MENTOR MAGIC

The Northern Colorado Bridge Unit 363 is a Community of Learners

We are very fortunate to have an active mentor program in our unit. The number of players at both our Monday and Wednesday mentor games in Fort Collins has increased so it is obviously a very popular event.

HOWEVER!!! It should be more than a one-time event. A mentor program should provide an opportunity for review and reflection that helps the mentee improve. Consider these possibilities:

-The mentor and mentee should establish regular dates. At the very least they should try to play at all of the mentor games.

-Provide time before the game to review the convention card. This is important in preparing for the game. The mentor should play the mentee's card; however, helping the mentee improve might take the form of encouraging a new convention. At the very least there should be a clear understanding of the agreements being used.

-Find a time after the game for review. On Monday that could take place right after the game and on Wednesday night some of the local establishments are still open. If those times don't work – try to calendar a date as close as possible to the game. In a pinch an on-line review can work. The review sessions are very valuable.

It has been wonderful to see these pairings go beyond the mentor games. At many of the club and unit games there are pairings of new with more experienced players. An atmosphere has been created where learning is supported and nurtured. Our newer players feel comfortable playing with the more experienced players and these advanced players are encouraging the newer players to grow. Everyone benefits when the unit itself becomes more competitive.

MORE BIDDING PROBLEMS & SOLUTIONS

While I don't encourage newer players to become excited by every new idea that comes along, I do agree that certain conventions and agreements are needed

I will present a problem and then suggest a solution to it. Please understand there is often more than one solution. I won't go into detail so to fully explain the conventions or agreements; you will have to do the homework.

MAXIMAL DOUBLES

PROBLEM: How do you make a game try in competition?

YOU OPP PARD OPP
1♣ 2♥ 2♣ 3♥
?

YOU OPP PARD OPP
1♣ Pass 2♣ 3♥
?

SOLUTION: Those rude opponents have taken up your room for a game try so a double here can be used to invite and 3♣ as only competitive. Partner can accept by bidding game, rebid 3♣ with a minimum, or pass the double for penalties.

SUPPORT DOUBLES

PROBLEM: How do you show three and four-card support in competition?

SOLUTION: A double in this sequence shows three-card support (hand #1) and a raise to 2♣ shows four-card support (hand #2). A redouble over the opponents' takeout double is another way to show three-card support. Knowing you have four trumps across from you is often very important. Giving up a penalty double in this situation is not a big loss.

WESTERN CUE BID

PROBLEM: Wanting to get to 3NT, how do you find out if partner has a stopper in the opponents' suit?

SOLUTION: The cue bid is a valuable tool. It may be used as a general force, show support, show a control, or as an asking bid. In #1 it's likely 3NT is the best contract if partner has a spade stopper and a cue bid here asks partner that very question. With #2, your first cue bid showed a limit or better diamond raise. Your next cue bid will ask partner if he has a spade stopper.

Here is a rule: "If the opponents have bid one suit, the cue bid **asks** for a stopper; if they have bid two suits, the cue bid **shows** a stopper."

DOPI, ROPI, & DEPO

PROBLEM: How do you handle interference over Blackwood?

SOLUTION: There are ways to show aces in this auction. The above three acronyms stand for:

DO (double w/zero) **P1** (pass w/1) bid the next suit w/2, etc.

RO (redouble w/zero) **P1** (pass w/1) bid the next suit/2, etc.

DE (double w/even) **PO** (pass w/odd)

DOPI and ROPI are used below five of your suit and DEPO is used for the higher auctions. Zero along with 2 & 4 is considered even.

IMPROVE YOUR PLAY

The Roman Keycard convention is used to ask partner how many keycards (aces plus the king of the agreed trump suit) he holds. A useful feature of the convention is the ability to ask about the trump queen. See if you could have stayed out of this slam.

BIDDING: North's leap to 4♠ showed 19+ points in support of spades. South knew they were in the slam zone and bid 4NT to ask about keycards. The 5♣ response showed 0-3 so South knew they were missing one keycard. His 5♦ bid asked about the queen of spades and North's return to the spade suit denied it. Knowing they were off a keycard and the trump queen, South gave up on slam.

PLAY: West led the diamond ace and waited on his spade trick. Many of the pairs reached the slam and felt very unlucky. It's true the slam would have succeeded if the outstanding trumps had divided 2-2, but at matchpoint scoring (pairs) you should not push for close games or slams. Take your plus scores is good advice.

While this convention is very helpful, it can also be dangerous. Be sure to research it and discuss with your partner before adding it to your card.
